2 Description of the Biomass Producer and the Supply Base

2.1 Description of the company

- Nhat Nguyet Anh Company Limited operates in wood pellet manufacturing and trading. The factory is located at Tung Chanh, Hoa Hoi commune, Gia Lai province. It has been running since 2024.
- The company has 2 external storages located in Gia Lai province, as follow:
 - + Quy Nhon Port at 02 Phan Chu Trinh street, Quy Nhon ward.
 - + Long My Industrial Park in Quy Nhon Tay ward.
- Pellets are manufactured at the facility, chipped inside the pellet plant and transported to storage where they are loaded directly onto the vessel and exported worldwide under FOB.
- The company has been certified FSC-COC-076219
- Under SBP scope, the company implements mass balance system.
- All raw material used are acacia and eucalyptus roundwood (primary feedstock) from plantation in Viet Nam.
- Feedstock types: FSC 100%, FSC CW or controlled material evaluated through the Organization's FSC DDS certified feedstock.
- The feedstock is registered as SBP controlled if no mitigation measures implemented.
- The feedstock is registered as SBP compliant if mitigation measures implemented as the followings:
 - + FSC 100% claim, only 1 indicator (2.2.1) requires mitigation measures
 - + FSC CW or controlled material: 13 indicators requires mitigation measures for smallholders and 15 indicators requires mitigation measures for private organization.
- All feedstock is EU RED compliant

Description of the chain-of-custody and upstream supply chain:

The company maintains a transparent upstream supply chain for its wood pellet production.

- Logistics Management: The transportation of feedstock from the forest to the factory is organized and managed entirely by the forest owners. Suppliers may utilize their own transport vehicles or subcontract to thirdparty logistics providers. The company's responsibility begins upon the arrival and delivery of the material at the factory gate.
- Traceability: Every delivery is strictly monitored at the factory gate. Our staff verifies all forestry and certification documents (FSC claims) to ensure that only compliant material enters the production chain, maintaining 100% traceability. The CoC system is activated immediately once the raw material is accepted at the facility. To prevent any risk of mixing, all SBP production is physically segregated with non-SBP production if any.
- Finished wood pellets are transported from the factory gate to Quy Nhon Port and Long My Industrial Park warehouse
- The wood pellets are segregated and stored in a warehouse, often for 1 to 3 months, depending on the export schedule. For export, we utilize the port's shore-crane system to load the pellets from the containers directly onto the vessel.

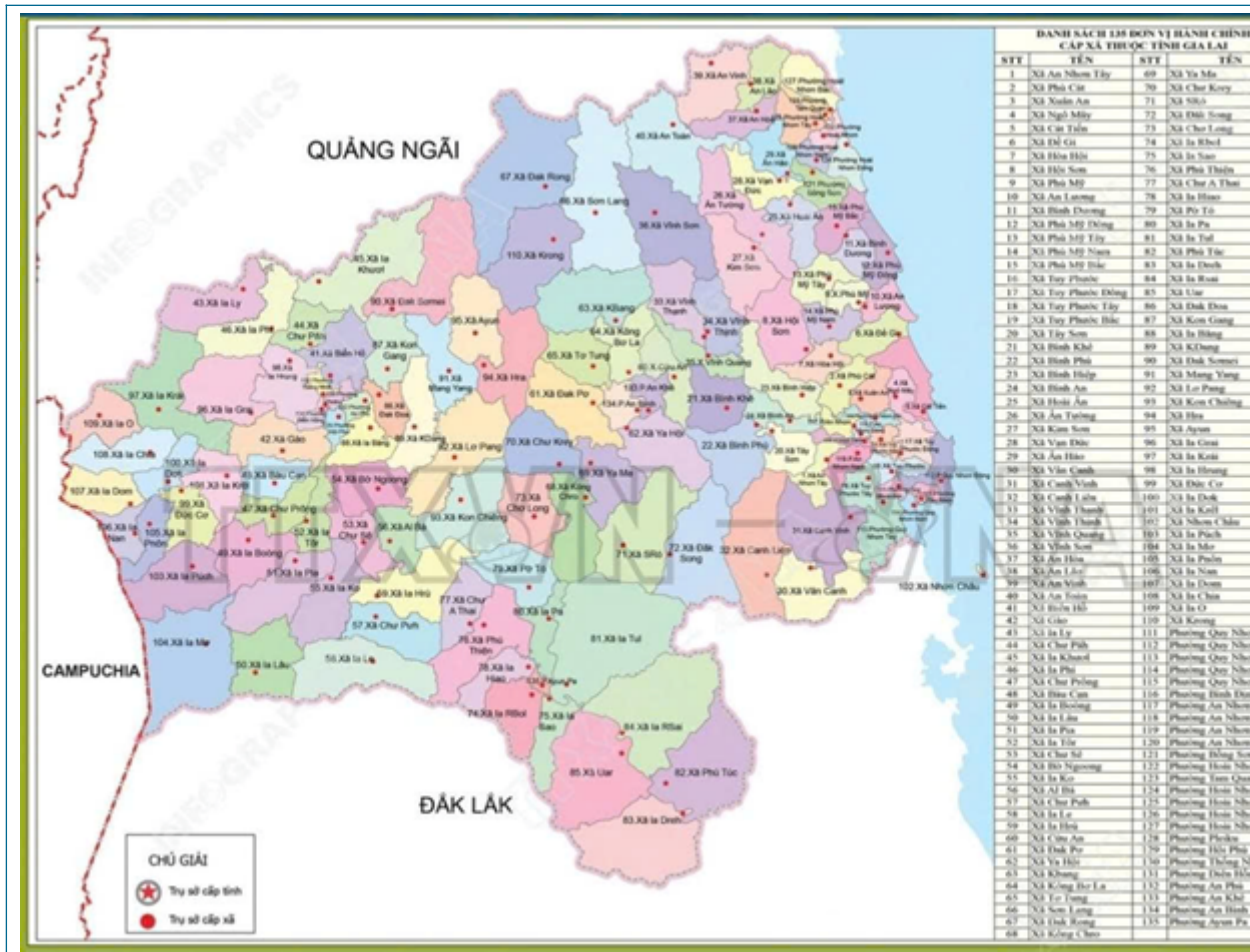

3.1 Summary of the Supply Base Evaluation

NHAT NGUYET ANH COMPANY LIMITED conducts a Supply Base Evaluation (SBE) in accordance with SBP Standard 1 and SBP Standard 2, based on the SBP Regional Risk Assessment (RRA) for Vietnam v1.0 and RED Level A Risk Assessment for Vietnam Forest v.1.1.

The SBE covers all primary feedstock sourced from within Vietnam and evaluates sustainability, legality, forest protection, and social responsibility risks. While most indicators are classified as low risk, certain areas — such as legal harvesting verification, high conservation value (HCV) protection, and supply chain traceability etc — are identified as specified risks. The company mitigates these through supplier declarations, field inspections, legality verification, stakeholder consultation. etc

3.2 Conflicts with applicable national and sub-national legislation

Forest planting and exploitation in Gia Lai province always comply with all laws and regulations of the Vietnamese government and local authorities.

Description of the specific risk:	
Vietnam has adequate legal regulations covering all supply base and biomass production activities. However, the implementation of legal rules for some aspects is still inadequate (based on the analysis in the relevant indicator), so this indicator is considered a risk identified for all smallhouse plantation.	
Mitigation measure:	
- Land Use Right Certificate or equivalent - The management contract or other agreements with the owner shall indicate clear management rights. - Valid business registration documents shall exist if supplier is company. - Inspections of harvesting sites shall confirm that harvesting takes place within property limits (including felling, extraction, and log landings - Stakeholder consultation. - Site verification	
Monitoring and outcomes:	
- Document reviewing: All forest-planting households possess land use rights certificates/land use right certificates/harvesting applications with local government confirmation or mining contracts with the commune/district. - Field inspection: Company purchasing staff conduct surprise inspections of some forest-planting households at times before, during, and after harvesting: No cases of illegal logging were detected; forest owners harvested within the scope stipulated in their land use right certificates (including felling, harvesting, and clearing of timber). - Consultation with relevant parties: The company did not detect any violations of current laws and regulations. - Monitoring: We implement the internal monitoring system to ensure the mitigation measures are implemented, use latest version of RRA for Viet Nam (if any updated). Description of the specific risk:	
The supply of timber raw materials in Vietnam is mainly from production forests, of which the majority of production forests have been allocated to households for management. However, with a large number of small forest owners (>1 million), the issuance of land use right certificates has yet to be fully implemented, so this indicator is considered a definite risk for small forest owners.	
Mitigation measure:	
FSC CW/Controlled materials : - Document reviewing: Checking land use right certificates (LURCs), land title deeds, or equivalent documents - On-site inspection - Consultation with relevant parties	
Monitoring and outcomes:	
- Document reviewing: The forest owners has land use right certificates (LURCs), land title deeds, or equivalent documents. - Consultation with relevant parties: Through consultation, it was found that the issuance of land title deeds and land use right certificates has not been completed for the entire area of production forests in these two raw material zones. However, all households planting forests to supply raw materials to the company have land title deeds, land use right certificates, or applications for forest confirmation with confirmation from the commune. - Field inspection results: The company found no boundary or land disputes at the forest sites of the households surveyed and consulted with relevant parties. - Monitoring: We implement the internal monitoring system to ensure the mitigation measures implemented, use latest version of RRA for Viet Nam (if any updated). The material come from the FMUs that the specified risks are not mitigated will be excluded.

1.1.3 Feedstock shall be legally harvested, supplied and produced, including in compliance with CITES, EUTR and other applicable legal trade requirements.	
Description of the specific risk:	
The primary feedstock in Vietnam is mainly sourced from planted production forests. The main species used for forest plantations include Acacia, Eucalyptus and Rubber, which are in the list of major forestry species (Circular 22/2021/TT-BNNPTNT dated 29/09/2021) and not listed under CITES. Harvesting permits are required for state-owned forest owners but not for households and individuals, while forest product inventory is mandatory for all forest owners. In practice, state owned organizations fully comply with the requirements for approving harvesting plans and forest product inventory. Smallholders mainly sell standing trees to intermediaries or traders. Therefore, filling in the forest product inventory is delegated or assigned to intermediaries or traders. Intermediaries or traders are not allowed to fill in the forest product inventory, which does not comply with current laws (Circular 26/2022/TT-BNNPTNT and Circular 22/2023/TT-BNNPTNT). In addition, the implementation and control of forest inventory for private forest owners has yet to be fully implemented. Therefore, specific risks are identified for feedstock originating from small forest owners and private organizations related to the requirement of forest inventory.	
Mitigation measure:	
FSC CW/Controlled materials : - Check CITES and EUTR lists - Consult with relevant parties - Inspect the site to determine if the species to be purchased, or the timber collection area, is on the CITES list to implement appropriate zoning and harvesting methods	
Monitoring and outcomes:	
- The company only purchases acacia timber from plantation owners. Acacia trees must be identified as not being on the CITES and EUTR lists.	

- When harvesting, plantation owners must notify the local authorities (commune/district People's Committee) and prepare a timber inventory list for each truckload as required by Circular No. 26/2022/TT-BNNPTNT.
- The company conducts checks on land ownership certificates, land use right certificates, logging applications, and timber product lists from timber suppliers.
- Consultation with relevant parties: Local authorities and forest rangers regularly monitor and inspect the planting, harvesting, and transportation of timber at planted forest households. No violations of current laws and regulations have been recorded in the commune/district.
- Monitoring: We implement the internal monitoring system to ensure the mitigation measures are implemented, use latest version of RRA for Viet Nam (if any updated). The material that comes from the FMUs that the specified risks are not mitigated will be excluded.

2.2.1 Feedstock shall not be sourced from land that had one of the following statuses in January 2008 and no longer has that status due to land conversion: a. Forests b. Wetlands c. Peatlands d. Highly biodiverse grasslands.

Description of the specific risk:

Although Vietnam has adequate legal regulations and effective mechanisms for managing forest and wetland land use, from 2006 to 2014, the conversion of depleted natural forests into plantation forests took place on a large scale legally. There are still sporadic illegal forest conversions to date. The loss of mangrove forests and peatlands has also occurred significantly. Therefore, this indicator is assessed as a specified risk.

Mitigation measure:

- Check land title certificate, land use rights certificate, or equivalent documents
- Consult with relevant parties

Monitoring and outcomes:

- Check land title certificate, land use rights certificate, or equivalent documents
- Consult with relevant parties: The forest is assigned by the government to households for self-management and cultivation, is identified as production forest, not forest converted to other land use purposes, and the specific area is determined. No peatland, wetland in the supply base.
- Monitoring: We implement the internal monitoring system to ensure the mitigation measures are implemented, use latest version of RRA for Viet Nam (if any updated). The material that comes from the FMUs that the specified risks are not mitigated will be excluded.

2.2.3 Soil quality in the Supply Base shall be maintained or enhanced

Description of the specific risk:

Although Vietnam has regulations to limit the negative impacts of forestry production activities, implementing sustainable forest management plans is optional for all forest owners. The short forest planting rotation and the widespread burning of vegetation can negatively impact soil quality. Therefore, this indicator is assessed as a specified risk.

Mitigation measure:

FSC CW/Controlled materials:

- Consultation with stakeholders
- On-site inspection of logging operations
- Interviews with forest owners

Monitoring and outcomes:

- On-site inspection of logging operations:
 - + No landslides or soil erosion were detected. Logging operations consistently maintain environmental integrity, protecting the soil from degradation and preventing water source pollution. Post-harvest, workers clear the area and collect waste. Logging residues are gathered and transported to processing sites, while leaves and small branches are chipped and evenly distributed across the ground.
 - + Smallholders are committed to avoiding harmful chemicals, opting instead for organic, phosphorus, and NPK fertilizers during the initial planting phase. Additionally, inspections of several planted forests revealed no traces of fuel or engine oil on the soil surface.
- Consultation with stakeholders: Local authorities require forest-planting households to maintain strict site sanitation in harvesting areas to minimize impacts on plant, animal, and microbial ecosystems, thereby safeguarding soil and water resources.
- Monitoring: We maintain an internal monitoring system to ensure mitigation measures are implemented, utilizing the latest version of the RRA for Vietnam. If residue management practices are found to degrade soil quality, cause erosion, or trigger landslides, materials from the affected FMUs will be excluded from the supply chain.

Forest fire management has completed legal regulations and implementation mechanisms, but smallholders do not fully implement these regulations due to limitations in awareness, knowledge and techniques. Regarding pest management, although there are regulations and technical procedures, all forest owners yet to have not effectively implemented them.

4.1.8 Training shall be provided for all workers to allow them to implement the conditions set out in all elements of the SBP Standards relevant to their responsibilities.

Description of the specific risk:

Vietnamese law has policies and regulations on vocational training and education for small and medium-sized enterprises in all production sectors. Training facilities in the forestry sector are provided for university-level workers and workers nationwide. However, training and technical and occupational safety guidance for enterprise workers has yet to be fully implemented. For small forest owners, production activities are mainly based on practical experience without training. Therefore, this indicator is assessed as a specified risk.

- + Interviews with representatives of the worker groups: they confirmed that they received and used all necessary personal protective equipment throughout the logging process.
- + The company conducted surprise inspections of the logging areas. No cases of workers not using personal protective equipment were detected.
- Regarding occupational safety instructions:
 - + Forest owners and team leaders independently instructed their workers on safety requirements during logging. In addition, company representatives conducting site surveys also disseminated safety requirements to forest owners and workers. Throughout the logging process, staff conducted surprise inspections in several forest areas to ensure these regulations were followed. To date, no serious work accidents have been recorded.
 - + Interviews with forest owners confirmed that they closely monitored the logging process to ensure the safety of the workers and to promptly handle any adverse situations.
 - + Interview with local authorities: Before logging, local authorities require forest owners to implement safety measures and provide personal protective equipment for loggers. In addition, forest rangers conduct several inspections to ensure compliance. In the last 2-3 years, there have been no serious work accidents in the area.
 - Monitoring: We implement the internal monitoring system to ensure the mitigation measures are implemented, use latest version of RRA for Viet Nam (if any updated). The material that comes from the FMUs that the specified risks are not mitigated will be excluded.

Vietnam has specific legal regulations on implementing protective measures that must be applied to protect the health and safety of workers. Statistics from the Ministry of Labor, War Invalids and Social Affairs also show that the number of occupational accidents in the forestry industry has been insignificant in the last three years. However, There has been no comprehensive assessment of the implementation of occupational safety and hygiene regulations in forestry, so this indicator is assessed as a specified risk for all subscopes

Regarding traditional customary ownership, the State always has a preferential policy for local communities and ethnic minorities in granting forest land use rights. The legal use rights according to traditional customs of local communities are also protected by the provisions of the Forestry Law and Circular 28/2018/TT BNNPTNT, Circular 13/2023/TT-BNNPTNT on sustainable forest management. Still, the identification of forests with significance in customs, practices and beliefs has only been well implemented by forest owners who are state organizations. For forest owners who are private organizations or small forest owners, the identification of forests with significance in customs, practices, and beliefs has yet to be fully implemented or has only stopped at the identification stage without solutions to ensure respect for traditional use rights. Thus, this indicator is assessed as low risk for state organizations and specified risk for private organizations and small forest owners.

Monitoring and outcomes:

+ During the roadmap development process, the authorities solicit public opinion through meetings. - In addition, local authorities encourage and allocate land to ethnic minority communities to participate in reforestation, aiming to improve their economic lives and raise awareness of forest protection.
+ The company purchases timber from several ethnic minority households: they confirm that planting and harvesting timber provides a stable source of income and helps improve their living standards. There are no disputes between Kinh (Vietnamese) and ethnic minority households involved in reforestation.

There is a labor safety regime for workers exploiting forest plantation households. - The production forest planting area does not have cultural values that need to be preserved, there are no rare animals and plants - The process of planting and exploiting forests does not affect the lives and beliefs of local people and ethnic minorities - The exploitation process does not affect the ecosystem of the area, does not pollute the soil and water environment, does not cause landslides, soil erosion, and ensures forest fire prevention and fighting. Although the burning of vegetation still exists in some forest plantation households, forest owners only carry out local burning in small patches, ensuring that it does not harm the soil and water ecosystems

Regularly educate and encourage households to avoid burning the topsoil, which causes landslides, erosion, environmental pollution, and easily leads to forest fires. Local authorities confirm that some households still collect and burn mining waste because the cost of hiring sanitation workers is quite high and time-consuming. However, very few households do this.

 - + No landslides or soil erosion were detected.
 - + The mining process always ensures environmental hygiene, does not affect the soil environment, and does not pollute water sources.
 - + After mining, workers clean the area and collect waste. Mining waste is collected and transported to a processing site, and any remaining organic matter (leaves, small branches, etc.) is chopped and evenly distributed.
 - + Tree stumps are cut close to the base, leaving the stump intact, avoiding digging/disturbing the roots.
